A REPORT ON NOVEMBER MEETING By Bing Poon

The four hundred and eighty sixth meeting of PVS commenced at the 20.2 hour of the twentieth day of November in the year of Our Lord 1979. The purveyor of fine PVS accessories exhibited his wares and extolled their virtues. The status of ski trips was mentioned.

(Editor's Note: Bing says this elaborate introduction is for people who like opening remarks similar to this. He disclaims accuracy.)

The meeting was hosted by Jan and Bob Marx at their lovely Virginia home. Larry Pease, Dick Clark, Bing Poon and <u>Allen Breed gave tips for safer, easier and better skiing as</u> follows: <u>Advantages of ski brakes</u>: Avoidance of whiplashing ski held by safety straps; ease of putting on and removing; convenience when using trams and gondolas. <u>Disadvantages</u>: Skies of some children seem to release easily while riding chairs; some areas may require a safety strap while using chairs; the released ski could easily be lost in powder snow. Some ski brakes may not work with a safety strap. Check with your ski shop on compatibility of the two.

Binding protection: Keep covered while in the car ski rack to protect them from dirt and salt as these contaminants can reduce the effectivenews of the release mechanism.

<u>Waxing</u>: Helps you to ski smoother and reduce the slowfast sensation in variable conditions. Johnson's Glo Coat is good for removal of black, sticky gook which coats the bottom of skiis on warm days under spring skiing conditions.

<u>Maintenance and Tuning</u> (according to expert <u>Larry Pease</u>) : Remove wax from ski bottoms (paint thinner is cheaper than "wax remover"); fill in gouges (when P-tex or candles are not available try polyethylene or polypropylene from plastic milk bottles or other containers); scrape bottom flush; flat file bottom and file edges to form edge of 90 degree; wax with hot wax, remove excess and smooth.

The Jan 15th meeting at the Heitchues will feature movies, refreshments, and an open forum to discuss skiing problems and possible solutions. Come and share your concerns about run down ski equipment, license for skiing, etc.

There are still plenty of openings for the Wisp weekends at Timberlake Chalet Jan. 11-13 and Feb. 8-10.



Penny Wiederhold

How are we so fortunate as to have as our hostess for the Annual PVS Christmas Farty our good friend and skiing companion, Penny Wiederhold? For that matter, why is she called Penny (not her legal name)? We--11, it is a long story, beginning on the cold snowwy slopes of the hills of New Hampshire, where we see a little girl sitting in the snow, waiting for Mother and Father to finish teaching people how to ski (no lifts --- lots of exercise). There she was given her knickname of Penny, by which we still know her, for her big, round eyes.

Penny's Father, Ford Sayre, ran the Hanover Inn and was one of the first certified ski instructors in the country. He is still well and fondly remembered in New Hampshire. Both he and his wife were ski instructors, so Penny, while not quite born on skis, was certainly brought up on them. After her Father's unfortunate death in World War II, the family moved to Colorado Springs, where her new Father was a stockholder in the Vail development, which meant free skiing for the family and lead to Penny's involvement with the Ski Patrol.

She came to Washington in 1961 to teach school and she and her husband have lived in the house we know in Chevy Chase since 1972. Here, through Ski Patrolling, she heard of the plan to organize a ski club for skiers and was a founding member. Now she skis in the West each year and on the Sutton trip (which she strongly recommends for families with youngsters). This year 32year-old Ted will be on skis too. Many of us first met Penny when she was our Membership Chairman. Most important, however, is her seemingly everlasting kindness in arranging our Annual Christmas Party in her charming bit of New England transplanted to our (usually) snowless Banana Belt.
