
PICNIC/SWIM/SAIL AT THE FLAKES

DIRECTIONS TO DEAN'S AT 256 LONG POINT RD., CROWNSVILLE, MD.

Approach Annapolis on Route 50. Turn off at first Annapolis exit (also labelled "Parole"). Stay right--road loops back under highway and becomes Route 178, General's Highway. Stay on it for about five miles. At the seventh stop light turn right onto Herald Harbor Road (Texaco and Gulf stations at intersection). At first stop sign turn left (still Herald Harbor Road). Follow winding street past Herald Harbor Mini-Mart and Fire Station, make no unnecessary turns. A sign indicates when it becomes Long Point Road; continue for ½-mile to 256, on your left.

Since parking is not allowed on narrow Long Point Road and space is limited, you'll have to unload your car, park it near the Mini-Mart, and be shuttled back. And forth. (Telephone 301-987-6017)

MEETING IN OLD TOWN ALEXANDRIA by Katherine Reynolds





COOK'S CORNER

EASY DOES IT *** Seems to me that if one can prepare a delicious treat - whether entree, appetizer, desert, or

whatever - and do it simply, quickly, and with little fuss, that recipe ranks as one of the outstanding ones to be kept, used, passed on to generations yet to be. The three recipes below fit all the criteria.

MOUSSELINE DE CAVIAR Jean Hensley

In fine strainer, drain, gently shaking: \cdot 1 (3 1/2 oz) can black Danish lumpfish caviar Gently shake strainer often. Set aside.

Soften in top of double boiler:

- 1 package Knox gelatin

- 2 Tablespoons fresh lemon juice

- 1 1/2 Tablespoons dry vermouth Dissolve over simmering water.

Add, stir until dissolved, set aside:

- 2 teaspoons anchovy paste!

Put through fine sieve or ricer: - 5 large hard cooked eggs

Gently fold together:

- Sieved eggs

- 3/4 cup light mayonnaise

- I Tablespoon Worchestershire sauce

1 Tablespoon grated onion

- Gelatin mixture from above

Very gently spread caviar on top of mixture. Mix together very lightly to prevent breaking - 1 (16 oz.) container sour cream the caviar roe. Lightly oil 2 cup fish mold. - 1 (8 oz.) Cool Whip. Fill with mixture. Chill overnight.

To serve: Unmmold on platter. Use olive slice for eye, pimento slice for mouth, and chives for gills. Garnish with parsley placed around mold. Serve with party pumpernickel rye or crackers.

Jean says she often uses individual molds for a lovely first course. Makes 6.

Heliophylanica Christophyladdida phaintal

ASPARAGUS-SEAFOOD SPREAD Nancy Garrett

In food processor, using steel blade, chop separately, remove, and set aside:

- 8 oz. imitation crab

- 2 green onions

Drain, reserving liquid:

- 1 (10.5 oz) can cut asparagus spears

Mix together:

- 1/4 cup asparagus liquid - 1/2 envelope Knox gelatin

Place in microwave, 30% power for 30 seconds to dissolve, or place over simmering water.

Using plastic blade, coarsly puree:

- Asparagus from above

Using plastic blade, blend until smooth:

- 1 (8 oz.) package "Light" cream cheese

- 1/2 can cream of celery soup

- Pureed asparagus

- 1/2 teaspoon celery seeds

- Dash coarsdy ground black pepper

Dissolved gelatin

Add crab and onion mixture and using touch on and off, mix together, but do not puree crab. Cover and chill several hours or overnight. Serve with Champagne crackers or wafers.

COCONUT CAKE

Aina Thomas

Follow directions of box of yellow cake mix using two 9-inch pans. Cool.

Mix together:

- 2 (6 oz.) packages frozen coconut, thawed

- 3/4 cup (or less) sugar

Place half on mixture on cake layer. Top with second layer. Use remainder of coconut mixture on top. Sprinkle coconut on top to make it look "fuzzy". Place in sealed cake container. Refrigerate for 3 days to allow flavors to blend.
