

COOK'S CORNER

To stuff, or not to stuff? That is the question!! Or it was when asked of all the cooks present at the

October meeting. The vote: 12 of 14 voted to stuff it!! Five of these both stuff and bake in a separate pan. Only two voted not to stuff. Should you wonder exactly what it is we are deciding to stuff - it is the THANKSGIVING TURKEY!!!

Another question posed was "What do you add to Turkey Stuffing/Dressing that makes it uniquely yours?" Answers follow:

Ken Evans adds lots of sage, hot sausage, coriander, fresh oregano, and of course, starts with a cornbread base.

Water chestnuts are added by Pres Janet Marx, and she noted that she stuffs it 'cause her Mother stuffs it. Mrs. Nier, Janet's mother, said she adds raisins.

Peggy Burns likes the touch that fresh apples give; doesn't like it too spicy, and is one who both stuffs and bakes.

Tarragon is the spice that makes dressing uniquely that of Janet Waln. (She doesn't stuff.) Sally Finan likes mint and basil. (Sally does stuff.)

Oysters are additions of Rosie Soler, Charlotte Eddy, Pat Tengle, and Shahrsad Miller. Chicken livers are added to the dressing of Dina Taylor for an enriched poultry taste. Karen Devorshak adds sausage and mushrooms.

The recipe from <u>The Encyclopedia of</u> <u>Cookery by Woman's Day</u> is **Gail Pease's** favorite. Gail likes the dressing as is with no extras.

The main difference between "stuffing" and "dressing" is how it is baked. As you might guess, stuffing is placed into the turkey cavities, while dressing bakes in a casserole dish.

NANCY'S BASIC DRESSING

- Bake one recipe cornbread using two cups cornmeal. Let cool. Reserve.

Saute:

- 1 stick butter or margarine
- 1 cup celery, chopped
- 2 large onion, chopped

In large bowl, add the following:

- Cornbread, from above, crumbled
- 1 8-oz. package Pepperidge Farm Herb Dressing
- Sauteed vegetables, from above
- 2 eggs, lightly mixed
- 1 teaspoon poultry seasoning
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon coarsely ground black pepper
- 1 Tablespoon chicken bouillon granules
- Chicken broth or warm water to sufficiently moisten bread crumbs.***

Bake in 350* oven for 30-45 minutes, or until top is nicely browned.

***Stuffing requires less moistening since it will absorb liquid from the bird as it cooks. Dressing needs to be very moist as it dries somewhat as it cooks. I bet all you good cooks already knew this.

Since the subject of the column this month addresses items that are stuffed, I would like to share with you the recipe for <u>STUFFED MUSHROOMS</u> that Myra Evans served to the club in October.

STUFFED MUSHROOMS

Place flat in pie plate:

- 2 dozen large mushrooms, from which stems have been removed and saved
- 1/4 teaspoon butter placed in each

Saute:

- 1 Tablespoon butter
- Chopped mushroom stems, from above
- 2 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 3 green onions, chopped
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley

Add and mix together:

- 3/4 cups bread crumbs
- 2 Tablespoons Parmesan Cheese

Fill mushroom caps with mixture. Sprinkle tops with additional Parmesan Cheese. Bake 350* for 15 minutes.

Following are excerpts: EAGLES DON'T FLOCK ... THEY SOAR, ONE AT A TIME. THROUGH THE AGES, THE EAGLE HAS BEEN USED AS A SYMBOL OF ROYALTY POWER, VICTORY, AUTHORITY, AND VALOR. TO THE EARLY CHRISTIANS, THE EAGLE WAS THE SYMBOL OF ASCENSION. THIS WAS DUE TO THE STRONG FLIGHT OF THE EAGLE WITH IT'S GAZE FIXED ON THE SUN. IN EARLY ICONS, IT WAS BEST KNOWN AS THE SYMBOL OF ST JOHN THE EVANGELIST. ON JUNE 20, 1782, THE EAGLE BECAME THE SYMBOL OF A NEW COUNTRY. BECAUSE OF ITS COURAGE AND BEAUTY, IT WAS CHOSEN TO SIGNIFY THE DIGNITY OF THE NEW UNITED STATES OF AMERICA. THE EAGLE BECAME A PROMINENT FEATURE OF THE SEAL OF THIS NEW REPUBLIC AND IS USED TO REPRESENT THE IDEALS OF THIS COUNTRY. IN 1911, FOLLOWING TRADITION AS OLD AS MAN HIMSELF, THE BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA CHOSE THE EAGLE TO SYMBOLIZE THE VERY HIGHEST IN ACHIEVEMENT. THROUGH ALL OF HISTORY, IT HAS BEEN THE SYMBOL OF MAN'S BEST; NOW THE EAGLE IS THE SYMBOL OF SCOUTING' BEST.
