
CHERRY BLOSSOM MID-WEEK WALK - THURSDAY APRIL 3rd.

The following statement was moved and passed by the Executive Committee at its March meeting.

WHAT IS A SANCTIONED SKI TRIP

A SANCTIONED SKI TRIP IS ONE THAT HAS BEEN AGREED TO BY THE TRIP COMMITTEE AND APPROVED BY THE EX-COM. THUS A SANCTIONED SKI TRIP IS CONTROLLED AND MONITORED BY THE TRIP COMMITTEE. IT REQUIRES THE TRIP LEADER TO COORDINATE ACTIVITIES OF THE SKI TRIP WITH THE TRIP COMMITTEE. THE TRIP LEADER MUST SUBMIT A DETAILED FINANCIAL REPORT AND THE TRIP COMMITTEE WILL REVIEW, ANALYZE AND SUBMIT TO THE EX-COM A TRIP EVALUATION REPORT. ALL OTHER SKI TRIPS ARE NOT SANCTIONED BUT MUST BE REVIEWED BY THE TRIP COMMITTEE AND APPROVED BY THE EX-COM BEFORE BEING MENTIONED AT PVS MEETINGS OR PUBLICIZED IN THE TOOT. ONE OR TWO DAY SKI TRIPS/ARE CONSIDERED AS EVENTS SUCH AS HIKING, BIKING AND RAFTING TRIPS ARE NOT CONSIDERED AS SKI TRIPS AS DEFINED ABOVE.

SPRING IN THE FRENCH ALPS

Val d'Isere, Lyon, Paris

What a super trip: Spring greeted us in full force in Val d'Isere blue skies, sunshine, and warm weather every day. Good snow - packed powder up high, and we bypassed the heavy wet at the bottom with cable car the last run down. Miles and miles of trails above timber line - we couldn't cover them all, and spectacular views in every direction. Superb.

We arrived in Paris Saturday, then to Lyon where we were met by bus (after a rather picturesque procession of loaded luggage carts through the airport looking for it!) for a beautiful three hour ride to Val d'Isere. Traffic was quite heavy but the driver knew all sorts of bypasses - fortunately, because we had two delays. Our hotel was half a block from slopeside and close to the center of town and shops. And wonderful dining - 4-course meals -- duck, lamb, chicken, veal, fondue - even crepes Grand Marnier for dessert. And great French bread. Sue had decorations her sister had sent, The dining room was darkened for the presentation of <u>two</u> cakes with lighted candles, and Sue got two kisses from the French waiter. What a birthday! Another special event was a tour and apres ski party at the Club Med - most interesting.

Parachute skiing was very popular. There were always some in the air soaring beautifully through the blue skies over the mountains and landing gracefully on skis on a ski trail. Only Christy Comerford had the courage to try it. She says it was exciting and wonderful, and has great pictures to remember it by. Christy and Reg Heitchue were out one day doing some super skiing with Dick Comerford and David Abraham and got separated from them. Searching for the way down they spotted a man in a Redskins cap. Help is at hand.' Reg asked if he was a Redstins fan. Shrug! Total 'Aha! Blah! He asked about different languages, Shrug. Then Christy asked what country he was. He answered "Czech". No English! Monday, with more spring weather, was all-day sightseeing - the Louvre with the new Pei triangle, the Latin Quarter, the Orangerie, a boat tour on the Seine (among other sights a French Statue of Liberty replica), walking and snacking and watching a white-robed mime on the Champs Elysees.

Then the <u>grand finale</u> - an elegant, dress-up dinner at the French Officers Club. A perfect evening: Kir royale served in a private reception room, a five course dinner in a private dining room at a banquet table with beautiful fresh flowers and silver candelabra. The gourmet dinner with wine included smoked salmon and lamb roast and ended with a flaming dessert served in a darkened room, followed by after dinner coffee. To close this lovely evening Marianne Cook's Paris friend Ernie played "God Bless America" on the piano in the room.
