your cook has been out of touch, the rest of you have kept right on cooking, eating, and enjoying. So that all can taste, a few recipes are presented for you to try. Coming in the next few months are recipes from the wonderful Spring Dinner at Bette Walker's and other recipes.

JEZEBEL

Marilyn Clark

Mix together well and let set overnight in refrigerator:

- 1 jar apple jelly
- 1 jar pineapple jelly 1 small can dry (powdered) mustard
- 1/4 -1/2 jar horseradish

Spread mixture over 8 oz cream cheese. Serve with mild crackers to scoop. Spicy 410 LE1.10103111

> VIDALIA ONION AND CHEESE SPREAD Genee Boykin

Mix together:

- 1 cup Vidalia onions, chopped
- 1 cup Swiss cheese, shredded
- 1 cup mayonnaise

Pour into baking dish. Bake at 325° for 20-25 minutes--or until lightly browned and puffy. Serve with crackers.

EGGPLANT DIP Karen Felker

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Peel, dice, and saute: - 1 lb. eggplant - 1/4 cup olive oil

Remove eggplant from pan and mash. In same skillet, saute:

- 1/2 cup diced onion (Add more oil if necessary)

Add to onion and cook 5 minutes: - 1/2 cup Hunt's tomato sauce

- 1/2 cup diced celery
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper

Chop and add to onion mixture: - 3 olives

1 teaspoon chopped almonds

Mix eggplant with onion mixture and add:

- 1 Tablespoon vinegar
- 1 teaspoon salt

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1 teaspoon black pepper

- 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt

Cook for 20 minutes to allow all flavors to blend. Chill several hours and serve with melba toast or crackers.

> PUMPKIN MUSHROOM SOUP Marilyn Clark

Saute until tender:

- 1 Tablespoon margarine 2 chopped shallots
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1/4 cup chopped parsley
- 1 lb. (approximately) fresh mushrooms

Pour mixture into bowl of food processor, add and puree:

- 1 (16 oz.) can pumpkin
- 1/2 cup light cream

6: edually add:

- 1 cup chicken broth
- Dash black pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon mace or nutmeg

Pour mixture back into pan and gently heat to boiling. To suit your taste, add salt and adjust seasonings. Serve with parsley sprig and center slice of mushroom for garnish.

JOSIE'S TREATS Lu Beale

Mix together well:

- 2 cups wholewheat flour (Add more as needed for right consistency)
- 1 cup cornmeal
- 2/3 cup Brewers or nutritional yeast
- 2 teaspoons garlic powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 egg yolks
- 3 boullion cubes dissolved in I 1/2 cups water

Roll out dough on cookie sheet. Crosshatch into small squares. Bake 20 minutes at 375°. Turn off oven and let dry out. Serve with doggie cocktails. Not only tasty, but flea repellent.
