See and Ski in Argentina

The grandeur of Argentina's Patagonia, the Old World beauty and tango passion of Buenos Aires, and to top it all off -- great skiing! We're planning this fabulous trip for August 12th to 23rd, 2000. This will include a day trip to Uruguay, an additional night in exciting Buenos Aires, round trip air to one of the seven natural wonders of the world, Iguazu Falls (on full-size jet aircraft-about 2 hours each way), two nights at the 5 Star Sheraton Internacional with falls-view rooms, all transfers, all breakfasts, one dinner and one lunch. This will result in our final return on August 26. Our current estimate of this chance-of-a-lifetime, threeday add-on is \$575. We highly recommend this additional stay.

They cover 310 acres of pristine marshlands, with 9 ponds representing different wetland habitats in North America, and over 20 species of waterfowl. There we saw trumpeter swans, , Canada geese, duskies (a smaller version of the Canada goose), snow geese, various species of ducks, owls, hawks, an American eagle, etc.

On a 3-mile walk through the marshlands, there was a 15-foot platform from which to get an overall view of the area, including the bay. There one might be lucky enough to see herons, egrets, rails, plovers, and other shore birds.

Following our tour of the wetlands, we all found our way to the BEAUTIFUL home of Lee and Sal Mahalatti on Prospect Bay in Grasonville, Maryland. There we spent much time admiring the beauty of this home, its furnishings and grounds, including their boat. Then came the lunch, with Persian and all kinds of sumptuous dishes. NORMAN ENGELMAN Nov. 20, 1918 - Sept 30, 1999

Norman was born in Philadelphia, and as a boy worked in his father's grocery store. He went to West Chester State College on a football scholarship. A broken collar bone quickly ended his football career, and he transferred to Temple University in Philadelphia to continue his college education. At Temple, he turned from football to theatre, and worked as a waiter to support his way thru college.

Between (1939 - 1942), Norman was a member of the Berkley Players in Philadelphia. He performed in many roles and directed numerous plays including Little Foxes, Margin For Error, Three Men On A Horse, Primrose Path, and many others.

Norman did acting and directing for USO American Theatre Wing, directing and acting for war bonds, security drives, etc. Other acting rolls included Geo. Washington Univ. Community Theatre, Goshen Players, Arena Stage, KG Players, and Montgomery Players. Norman is probably best remembered by PVS for the 21 major rolls at Montgomery Playhouse.

Norman worked for the Federal Government for 27 years. He started his career in Baltimore, and drifted into the D.C. area where he retired at the young age of 52 from the Army Department. This gave him more time to devote to travel, acting, skiing, and a little tennis. He joined Club Americana Travel Group, and lead tours to Kenya, China, Mexico, Italy, S. America, and U.S.

Norman was active in Fagowees, SCWDC, and PVS. He lead many two week ski trips. He is probably best remembered for his Utah trips which he ran every other year with the group staying at the Salt Palace Travel Lodge in Salt Lake City. He also lead trips to western Canada, Idaho, Wyoming, Vermont, and Colorado. In later years, Norman liked to start his skiing in Winter Park, Colorado, and finish the season late in March in Salt Lake City, Utah. The pre and post trip parties at the Engelman home in Potomac set a high standard for other trip leaders to try and follow.

Norman leaves behind his wife, Mary, after 48 years of marriage, two brothers, and a sister. He will be missed by many.
