PVS will be joining other Blue Ridge Ski Council clubs for six days of skiing in legendary Chamonix, France. This traditional European area with over 70 pistes in six major areas, provides ample skiing for all abilities. We will be staying at the 3-star Hotel Alpina, a lively modern hotel near to town attractions and lifts.



Consider also the optional 4-day extension of wine-tasting and exploring in the Beaujolais and Cotes-du-Rhone regions outside Lyon, France. These areas date their wine production back to Roman times. (We will, however, be sampling somewhat younger wines!) Lyon itself is a natural for PVS as it bills itself as the gastronomic capital of the world – whether you choose Michelin 3-star fare or the humble "bouchons" serving local specialties.

Prices are not yet firm, but we are estimating \$1390 for the base trip, which includes breakfast and dinner in Chamonix with special BRSC & PVS events during the week but does not include lift tickets. With the complete Lyon extension, we estimate \$2215.
