

Greetings Members!

Just back from the Slopedusters' week-long skiing adventure in Telluride, I wish to share with you a couple of observations. First, is my encounter with the members of our Telluride trip under the devoted leadership of Gene and Wilma Sharer. On our only overlap day we met twice: In the morning, when I came to pick up whoever was ready to venture out and be shown some of this vast area, then again at lunchtime in and in front of the mountain's most popular restaurant. What I saw was a bunch of happy people who, seemingly, irrespective of their particular skiing abilities and general physical conditions, were gloating in this unique environment, just loving this combination of breathtaking panoramas and abundant snow cover, facilitating the activities for which all of us came. All I could think was: there must be some magic in this which turns the most serious-minded among us into something of the playful children we were yesteryear.

My other, and quite related, observation has to do with what is now confirmed as an ever increasing number of skiers whose chronological clock has long surpassed the number at which there used not to be any skiers. The National Ski Areas Association recently confirmed that 31% of us who skied last season were older than 45, compared with 21% 7 years earlier. Michael Berry, the association's president, attributed the change to generally healthier seniors, who stay active and fit well into retirement, and better equipment that makes turning much easier on aging muscles and creaky joints. Occasionally we're confronted by some hot-shot youngster whose probing looks seem to say 'what the hell are you old guys doing up here'; we shouldn't be discouraged by such provocations, and just keep proving that age no longer determines how long we're privileged to enjoy our most favored pastime. Let's all just keep getting out there and partaking in the fun.

And so we're off to entirely new terrain, the slopes of Lillehammer, and selected capitals of Scandinavia. By the time you read these lines we will have skied and seen the wonders of the Bergen fjords. Soon after it will be back home again, and getting ready for some more of this winter's delights. I'm hoping many of you are active participants, and having a great time at it.



Thirty-three blue bootie-clad PVSers had the


