SKI TALK - APRIL 2016



After skiing in Snowmass and Snowbird/Alta, the Jablons and I decided we were not ready to end the ski season quite yet. So we went to Steamboat for five days of skiing mid-March. We were hoping for snow and we got pummeled! After the first day of sun and ice, the storms moved in. By the end of the week we were skiing in a foot of powder. It was quite a challenge but we skied with guides each day. Every day at 9:15 the "Mountain Masters" (who were previously the "Over the Hill Gang," but who are now official Steamboat guides) take groups of age 50+ skiers all over the mountain. Usually there are several guides who separate the group into Mellow, Advanced and Aggressive skiers and ski with the group until around 3:00 PM. This is a wonderful opportunity to ski the whole mountain and go to areas you may not find on your own.

The club has two trips approved for next year. In

January, we will be going to **SNOWMASS**, again staying at the Snowmass Mountain Chalet. In March, we will be participating in the BRSC Eurofest at **GRINDELWALD**, Switzerland. Kathy and Barry Lake have agreed to lead the trip to Snowmass, and Inge Lesjak will lead the trip to Grindelwald. We are happy that Barry and Kathy have stepped up to the plate to lead the Snowmass trip, and that Inge has agreed to lead the Grindelwald trip. These trips will be advertised in the May TOOT. At that time, please consider signing up early so we can meet the deadlines for deposits to hotels.

The club cannot run ski trips without trip leaders. The trip leaders are responsible for advertising the trip in the TOOT and on the PVS web site; receiving trip payments; maintaining detailed financial records and coordinating payments to the trip vendor. In addition, the leaders need to keep track of skiers and non-skiers and make sure people get appropriate lift tickets, air tickets, etc.



They also arrange the trip's social activities, which include, at a minimum, a group dinner. Our leaders are there to provide assistance to skiers who may become injured or ill, or encounter other emergencies. A significant amount of effort goes into running a trip, and trip leaders are compensated for room, air and lift tickets, depending on the number of people who go on a trip. Another major benefit of being a trip leader is the satisfaction you get when the trip goes well. We are most grateful for those who agree to lead a trip and hope that more members of the club consider doing so in the future.

PVS/BRSC EUROFEST SKI TRIP
MADONNA DI CAMPIGLIO, February 26 – March 6, 2016



Twenty-six skiers from PVS and other clubs went on the Inge-led contingent of this ski trip to Madonna di Campiglio in Italy. In addition to our local skiers, there were people from Vermont, Connecticut, New Jersey, North Carolina, Florida, Michigan, Texas, and California.

The bus from the Venice airport went through scenic countryside with glimpses of many villages, vineyards, farms, and churches. It was raining until we got up into the mountains where the precipitation turned to snow. Overnight, 12 inches of snow fell, which was a blessing, because it had been quite icy before we arrived. It also snowed a few nights while we were there.

The hotel was very nice, the bedrooms were comfortable, the food was good, there were many nice

public rooms, and there was a wonderful spa. There was also a ski rental shop, and agents who came to the hotel every night to sell ski passes and lessons. The ski slopes were easy to get to. The Alpine slopes were designated in the European style as blue, red, and black, with the majority being black. The grooming (or lack of) and signage were not what some skiers were used to, either. A few skiers found themselves far away from the hotel at the end of the day or missed the last lift and had to find transportation back to the hotel. Such are the experiences that make up a skiing adventure. In spite of or because of the adventures, the group enjoyed the entire experience and most would return.



The BRSC held events on three nights, each event included a ticket for wine or beer, and a dance was held after dinner one evening. The PVS group enjoyed a happy hour on another evening.

There was a pre-trip to Florence, which people really enjoyed. Three other trips were optional - one to Mantua, one to Verona, and one to Lake Garda. Quite a few of us went on the Lake Garda trip where we visited a beautiful village named Sirmione, which had a 17th century moated castle, 14th century church, house that Maria Callas had lived in, and some Greco-Roman ruins. The bus was stopped on the autostrada for a hour due to an accident going to the lake.

Venice was fun. It was very windy and then rained heavily the first evening. We went to San Marco Square, stopped in a cafe, wandered around in the back streets, and then found a restaurant for dinner. After dinner the



square was flooded and platforms were erected to walk on. Going back on the vaporetto, we saw some buildings that were flooded into the first floor.

Inge, our trip leader was wonderful, helpful, and informative.

Members' Corner

It is very interesting to hear from PVS Members about their activities and interests other than skiing. JanaLee Sponberg shares about her trip to Tajikistan, and about the humanitarian endeavors, which ensued on her work trip. Serving is one of the joys within our lives. Three cheers for JanaLee!

Tajikistan is a mountainous landlocked sovereign county in Central Asia. It is bordered by Afghanistan to the south, Uzbekistan to the west, Kyrgyzstan to the north, and China to the east. As a result of the breakup of the Soviet Union, Tajikistan became an independent nation in 1991.

Building in Tajikistan:

I was disappointed to miss the Jubilee celebration. I had a very good reason. I was participating in a Habitat for Humanity International Project in Tajikistan. Thirteen members formed a team to finish two houses in the Dusti Settlement located 20 miles north of the Afghanistan border. Two mud brick blockhouses needed insulation, plaster, floors, ceilings, mud roofs, doors and windows. The yard needed clearing and leveling, as it was filled with weeds, trees and shrubs. We cut down trees and dug out roots. We built a wall at the front of the compound. We worked each day carrying water, lime, sand, gravel, cement, and plaster in buckets wherever it was needed on site. Within 10 days there was a transformation in this property. We knew that 11 family members would be able to move out of an overcrowded brother's home and move into their own homes before winter set in.

Tajikistan is one of the poorest countries in the world. I was sad to see the poverty and the primitive living conditions, especially the lack of clean drinking water. I had no preconceived expectations but the Tajik people that I met were the kindest most appreciative people. We worked

with plaster masters, builders and workers who assisted in completing each of the numerous projects. They made sure we had materials that we needed each day and that work was done properly. The children came by to help when they were out of school. I thought they were such beautiful people who were very caring and genuine and wanted us to feel welcome in their country. We enjoyed their unique hospitality.

The weather was warm, ranging in the 70s and 80s during the day and 40s and 50s in the evening. Our diet was simple. Breakfast was bread, rice porridge, and some days an egg. Lunch was brought to the worksite and was a meat dish with rice or beans or potatoes. Evening meals were a choice of soups, meat (chicken, lamb, goat or beef) a vegetable and potatoes. I thought the food was good but hard work does make one very hungry! Each morning we stopped at the market for fresh fruit and bottled water on our way to work.

I'm very satisfied with this experience, hard work included, but it reminds me that there is a great deal of need in our world. I didn't need to go to Tajikistan to find those in need. When asked if I'm ready to do this again, I'll say yes. In fact I'm headed to Cuba in April to work on another project.



Visit to Alexandria's Black History Museum

On March 23, 2016, about 14 PVS history buffs converged on Alexandria's renowned Black History Museum to learn about the trials and triumphs of local African Americans dating back to the time of the Civil War. Maryann Rozzell, a docent at the museum for many years, arranged for us to meet with the museum's Director, Audrey Davis, a dynamic and knowledgeable speaker sought after for her insights into this dramatic time in our nation's history. Ms. Davis is presently also serving as a consultant to the TV drama, *Mercy Street*, currently showing on PBS.

Ms. Davis animatedly related to us the story of the first of many slaves who sought refuge at the Union-held Fort Monroe near Hampton Roads. General Benjamin Butler made the fateful decision to protect them from those who

wanted them returned to slavery by calling them "contraband of war." This decision spurred many others to seek the same refuge and set the stage for their roles supporting the North in the Civil War conflict.

Many say that their contributions from that day helped to dramatically speed up the end of the war.

Thousands of these "contrabands," as these escaped slaves were called, settled in Alexandria where they were able to improve on their living conditions and influence Alexandria's future as an integrated city. However, as late as 1939, Alexandria still had no library available for African Americans; the only library was reserved for the use of whites only. This led to a historic sit-in by five young African Americans at the all-white library where they were subsequently arrested. After a tense

time, ultimately their courage resulted in the formation in 1940 of a library for the African American community, which was the genesis of the Black History Museum we see today in Alexandria.

Our group was enlightened as well by the other exhibits in the Museum including 19th century pictures and a historical account of the areas in Africa from which so many were taken and sold into slavery.

Today, in addition to visiting the Museum itself, you may walk in Alexandria's Contraband and Freedmen Cemetery Memorial located at the corner of Washington and Church Streets. For more information about Alexandria's Black History Museum please see the link here, www.alexandriava.gov/blackhistory, and consider a visit to this important museum yourself.

After the tour we were able to share our thoughts on what we had seen and to enjoy a good lunch on a gorgeous spring day in Alexandria. Many thanks go to Maryann Rozzell for sharing this historical treasure with us.

And it was a long time ago—I believe it was 1961! It was over half a century ago; so long ago that TV was only called V. The Tele part came later.

Although I have yet to make any formal announcement, the **Knee** is contemplating a run for President. (Lord knows, everyone else is.)
