officers who will serve the club well, and I look forward to my continued participation in the club.

For my last column, I cannot resist writing about the recent long weekend that Bob and I spent in Killington. Vermont. After this weekend, it is quite clear why most of my skiing over the past 40 vears has been in the West. First, there is the day-long drive up Vermont, fighting trucks and traffic jams on the New Jersey turnpike. Second. although Vermont skiers are tough, and can ski on anything, I

have become soft - what the Vermont skiers call "hard snow" would simply be ice to Western skiers. the slopes Third, are narrow, and can be far crowded than more Western mountains Vermont, however, beautiful, and worth a trip once in a while.

Killington lured me this particular weekend because of a two-day

weekend mogul clinic. How better to improve one's mogul technique than two days skiing ice and rocks? The seasoned Vermont skiers assured me that the conditions at Killington were as good as they get, and could not understand how I could declare the slick snow to be "ice."

I did learn quite a bit from my instructor, including tips that apply to skiing on groomed slopes, as well as moguls. The third day, I also tagged along on a semi-private late afternoon lesson with Bob, and learned a few things as well from his instructor. One observation is that Eastern skiing is different than Western skiing – in the West, there is a focus on wide carved turns; in the East, virtually all the skiers are doing short radius turns. Eastern skiers also keep their feet much closer together than Western skiers.

Here are the key general points that my instructor emphasized:

- 1. Proper angulation is critical the hips should be angulated into the hill, while the upper body looks down the fall line. The upper body should not follow the skis, i.e. if the skis are positioned across the fall line, the upper body should be facing down the fall line.
- 2. The weight must stay balanced and forward (sitting back in the bumps is a big problem). Bob's instructor described the proper body position as "moving the hips over the balls of the feet." Make sure that you do not bend over at the waist.
- 3. As you turn, release your body laterally down the hill (this is a movement of the body up over the skis and down the fall line it obviates the need to shift weight to the new downhill ski). On the bumps, it is a leap of faith to essentially throw your body down the hill.
 - 4. Keep your poles forward.

The valet or concierge will direct PVSers to the Party Room upstairs

- 5. As you turn, apply pressure to the tops of both boots if you can't pressure the ski that is advanced, move it back somewhat.
- 6. Both my instructor and Bob's instructor advised that, for hard snow (i.e., ice), use very gentle movements in edging and applying pressure, and use less edge; in other words,

apply the brakes slowly.

For the bumps, there are several additional techniques:

- 1. As you mount the bump, your lower legs should flex (go down) to absorb the bump. This movement downward should start before the pole plant (you are reaching downhill with the pole plant). Stay in the down position until you reach the fall line, and then come up and extend your legs.
- 2. Make sure the skis are pivoting together (this also applies to a turn on a groomed slope).
 - 3. Keep your skis closer together in the bumps.
- 4. There is less edging in the bumps; the skis should be flat as you make the turn. There appears to be a variance of opinion as to how much edging is required at the end of the turn in the bumps; the terrain may determine the amount of edging that is needed.
- 5. Keep your chin up and try to look ahead to as many bumps as possible.
- 6. In icy conditions (the ice is usually in the valleys between the bumps) ski from the side of one mogul to the side of another to avoid the ice.

I hope that these tips are helpful. The ski season will be essentially over when you read this column, but there is the potential of Chile in the summer, and the prospect of the 2013-2014 season. Again many thanks go to everyone who contributed so much to PVS over the past two years.





Cheesy Mushroom Pinwheels

<u>nwheels</u> -Louann Eadie

Ingredients

2 cups (about 6 oz.) minced mushrooms

½ cup chopped green onion

1 Tbsp butter

8 oz. cream cheese, room temperature

1/4 tsp salt

1 Pillsbury thin pizza crust

cooking spray

1 egg

1 tbsp water

2 tsp poppy seeds

Instructions

Cook the mushrooms and green onions in butter until softened. Allow to cool for a few minutes, then combine with the cream cheese and salt in a small bowl. Spread the cheese-mushroom filling over the pizza crust.

Roll the pizza crust from the long side pinching the ends to seal. Cut the roll into ½-inch slices and place on a baking sheet coated with cooking spray. Combine the egg with water in a small bowl and brush over each slice. Sprinkle with poppy seeds.

Bake at 400 degrees 10-12 minutes or until golden brown. Remove to a baking sheet to cool. Serve warm or at room temperature.

Sour Cream Coffee Cake: Family Recipe -Louann Eadie

Ingredients

Tube pan: butter & flour (I use can spray with flour)

Oven: 350° 2 cups flour 1 cup sugar

1 stick unsalted butter softened (sit out for awhile), cut into little pieces

2 eggs

8 oz sour cream

1 tsp salt

1 tsp baking soda

1 tsp baking powder

1 tsp vanilla

Instructions

Mix all ingredients together in a big bowl.....I use a fork or spoon.

Pour into baking tube pan, mix together 1/3 (or more) cup of sugar and 3-4 TB of cinnamonpour all over the batter in pan......cut through the batter with a knife.

I have a convection oven so it only takes about 45 min. to bake. Keep checking after that. When the top turns brown and is formed to the touch.....I remove to a baking rack. Enjoy!!!

Ski Trip Report:

THE CANYONS, March 17 – 24, 2013

Under cover of darkness on Sunday, 17 March, eleven PVS members assembled at Dulles for the trip to The Practicing appropriate security measures to ensure continuity of PVS leadership, VP Bob Knopes took a flight through Chicago to Salt lake City (SLC), where he rented a car for the drive to The Canyons. PVS President Cara Jablon accompanied the group on the flight through Denver to SLC and by bus to The Canyons, where the group soon was rounded out at twelve with the addition of Liz Warren-Boulton's son, Geoffrey.

The excitements of Sunday, which began for most trip participants around 4:00 am, concluded with a very well appointed après ski gathering hosted by the trip leaders, A surprise Liz Warren-Boulton and Reg Heitchue. participant was Rosemary Schwartzbard, not only making the trip, but free of her crutches from the accident earlier in the season at Steamboat. Rosemary spent most of her days in intense physical therapy at the spa, carefully avoiding all of the snowboarders in the pool.





On Monday, the group had a full morning mountain tour with Canyons guides Art and Brady. Bob Jablon not only had his lunch cut short but also got separated from the group on the first run after lunch. After another welltabled après ski, the group split for dinner, some to the Red Tail for a variety of appetizers and others to Drafts for "garlic burgers" and beer. Tuesday was Cara's day to overcome her fear of heights sufficiently to ride the "Short Cut" lift – twice. Under glorious spring skies, most of the PVS group assembled for lunch at the Sun Lodge; then, Liz and Geoffrey made a run through the combined glade/mogul area under the Tombstone lift. The entire group journeyed to Park City for dinner at the Prime Steak, joined by Dave Lerner (with his left arm in a sling due to a broken clavicle).

Wednesday the skiers faced heavy snow all morning. Liz, Reg, Bob K., Cara, Marianne, and Kerry tried to ignore the weather and found a few runs of great powder in the morning but encountered heavy, tacky snow in the afternoon. During the halt for lunch, Cara and Liz found that some strategically placed paper towels help

Saturday morning brought memories of January skiing, with 28 degree temperatures and a sharp wind but crisp snow and another great day of skiing. One more well-supplied


après ski at Liz's suite was enjoyed, and an early bedtime was recommended due to a 4:30 am bus drive to SLC for the flight home.


The Canyons, Utah, 2013





Work Begins on BIG's Waste to Energy Ski Slope Project in Copenhagen – Karen Felker/Marvin Hass http://inhabitat.com/work-begins-on-bigs-waste-to-energy-ski-slope-project-in-copenhagen/

"At the end of 2011, we were almost certain that BIG's fantastical, double-duty ski resort and waste to energy plant was dead in the water. Now, we're surprised



to learn that the project has been given the go-ahead and has already broke ground. According to WAN, work has begun today on the 95,000 sq m

Amagerforbrændingen Energy Plant outside of Copenhagen. The plant will incinerate trash and turn it into energy for the city, while also serving as a destination recreation spot and an urban ski resort. We've got a lot of mixed feelings about this project as it burns trash and releases tons of CO2, but we do like the multi-purpose functionality and green strategies wrapped into the design. Guess we'll have to hide and watch.

The project was initially denied because the waste company wanted to increase the capacity of the plant — meaning burning more waste and releasing more CO2. At the same time, Europe has a growing waste problem, not enough landfill space and not a high enough recycling rate to not burn their trash. BIG's proposal,



while certainly not perfect, takes a necessary evil and turns it into something useful.

The project, which broke ground on March 4th, 2013, will

take the city's waste and burn it to create energy. A special smoke stack will track the amount of CO2 is released; every time 1 tonne of CO2 is released, the smokestack will emit a 30m-wide smoke ring to help raise awareness about waste and energy production. Rather than a boring power plant, the top of the facility

will be built as a ski resort with runs for all levels and even a terrain park. The surrounding area will also provide expanded recreation space and green areas. Vegetation will be planted in the specially designed exterior to make the plant like a large green mountain.

Ulla Rottger, Director of Amagerforbrændingen, commented on WAN: "BIG's proposal contributes to the city with something useful and beautiful. We see this creating a lot of opportunities and with this unique building we can brand the Danish knowledge and technology to show the world our abilities within the environment and energy issues." BIG is collaborating with realities:united, AKT, Topotek 1 and Man Made Land on the design and construction on the new waste to energy Plant."

Big Thanks:

Over the years, TOOT has been distributed in various ways. No doubt, it was at one time distributed as a one-page mimeographed handout. As PVS membership increased, covering a larger geographical area, TOOT was distributed via USPS. Then, technology advanced with home computers, e-mail, cross-platform applications, along with skyrocketing postage. TOOT distribution to members went the way of portable document format (pdf) to decrease distribution time and cost. We no longer offer USPS TOOT distribution to applicant members. Some ski clubs now charge their members, above the cost of dues, for USPS distribution of their newsletters because of excessive cost.

PVS continues to provide the TOOT gratis to 7 members who do not have an e-mail address on record in the PVS database. Many of these 7 have given dearly in service to PVS during their membership tenure. Over the 48 years in which TOOT has been published, many have helped distribute our newsletter via USPS. Special thanks go to them and the last two volunteers, Sharon **Mulholland** and then Barbara **Leonhardt**, who have each taken on this task each month for over a year each. We really appreciate all of you folks.

Beginning with this TOOT issue, Barbara is stepping aside from this much appreciated task. Now, we have one volunteer, for each of the 7 PVS members, who will see to it that a printed copy of the TOOT will be distributed via USPS to her assigned member. Three cheers for these volunteers.

Where has March gone? It simply disappeared from the calendar and didn't leave a trace. The months and years fly by with an accelerating pace. I barely remembered it.)
