President's Message:



I am looking forward to the end of the hectic holiday season, and the beginning of the ski season. I realize that the ski season has already begun for some of our members, and I envy Dave Lerner for his projected 100 days of skiing this year in

Utah. Those of us who attended the presentation by Brian Eardley at the Ski Center last month learned about all the new equipment that should make skiing easier, namely the even wider skis (best, of course, for deep powder), and the many innovative ski boots.



In showing us the various new ski models, Brian described the skis in terms of "camber," "sidecut," "rocker," and "reverse camber." Brian noted that the ski shapes were "getting interesting," and pointed in particular to the development of a "five point" ski, with five points of contact and reverse camber and side cut in the tip and tail. I thought it would be useful to have a better understanding of these terms,

and have done some research, which I present below.

The term "camber" refers to the shape of the edge of the ski, viewed from the side. In a traditional camber ski, the tips and tails have a slight upward tilt; the skis make contact with the snow below the tip and above the tails, and the center of the ski is arched up slightly away from the ground/snow (this arch is often referred to as "positive camber" or just "camber").

"Sidecut" is the shape of the edge of the ski, viewed from the top or bottom. A ski with "sidecut" is wider at the tip and tail than at the waist of the

ski. There are different amounts of "sidecut" in various skis; Brian recommends a waist of 80-95 cm. (a narrow ski would have a waist of 65-78 cm.). Weighting of a traditional camber sidecut ski, with rotation onto the edge, causes the ski to bend, make contact with the snow along the entire length of the ski, and allows the skier to "carve" a turn. Due to their good edge contact, camber sidecut skis, in addition to providing easy handling and responsive turning, offer good grip on icy slopes.

Rocker skis have tips and/or tails that rise off the ground earlier than in a camber ski, and the midsection is lower to the ground. In a ski with tip "rocker," the tip starts to go up before the sidecut ends, but the ski has "positive" camber for most of the ski. This type of ski will float in powder; depending on the design, the ski can retain good edge grip due to the positive camber (however, some tip rocker skis offer less edge contact and grip on hard packed snow).

From the Beltway

Take the Beltway I-495 to the River Road exit, MD-190E, toward Washington. Stay on River Road for 3.7 miles. Turn right onto Little Falls Parkway and, after .6 mile, turn left at the light onto Massachusetts Avenue (MD-396). Two lanes turn left onto Mass Ave – stay in the right lane. Take the first right onto Falmouth Road. 5315 is .3 mile on the left. It is a yellow brick house with green/black shutters.

From the South through Washington, DC

Make your way to MacArthur Boulevard. Turn right on Loughboro Road. Turn left on Dalecarlia Parkway. Enter the roundabout and take the 4th exit, Massachusetts Avenue, and proceed into Maryland. After .6 mile, turn left on Falmouth Road. 5315 is .3 mile on the left. It is a yellow brick house with green/black shutters.

Alternate Route through Washington, DC

Take Massachusetts Avenue north through Washington. After the roundabout on Westmoreland Circle, continue north on Massachusetts Avenue and proceed into Maryland. After .6 mile, turn left on Falmouth Road. 5315 is .3 mile on the left. The house is a yellow brick with green/black shutters.

Tail rocker refers to the tail of the ski going up before the sidecut ends. A ski with tail rocker makes a ski easier to ski backwards in powder. Skis with both tip and tail rocker will have some positive camber (upward arch) in the center of the ski. Skis with both tip and tail rocker are biased towards only powder skiing.

There are also full rocker skis, which have a flat camber in the middle of the ski, with tip and tail rockers. Full rocker skis are also referred to as "reverse camber" skis. This type of ski is good at floating in powder, but offers little grip on hard packed snow.

Among the boots that Brian showed us were (1) a three piece boot with a tongue that flips open; (2) boots with "intuition" liners for people with cold feet; (3) a boot by Atomic with soft material on the side for feet with bunions; (4) a boot with a screw that can widen the boot at the front; (5) climbing style boots that have a back release walking feature; and (6) a Fischer vacuum boot with a shell that is heat molded to the contour of the skier's foot. Many of the new boots are lighter in weight.



We also learned about new goggles that have easy to change lenses, which attach to the goggles by magnets.



If you are in the market for new skis, what ski is best for you, with all the options available? Unless you are planning to spend most of your time in deep powder, or want to buy a second pair of skis just to use as powder skis, you should probably purchase a more traditional camber sidecut ski. Brian recommended a Solomon BBR ski, which has an almost slalom sidecut, and is a good all mountain ski because it is quick and easy to turn. Stockli, a small Swiss company, is making a similar ski. I have been very pleased with the Atomic skis

that I bought several years ago from the Ski Center. My husband also bought Atomic skis, after trying quite a few demo skis; he is very happy with his Atomics, and has pronounced them far superior to his prior pair of K2 skis. I suggest that you take a trip to the Ski Center to discuss with them the many options available this year in both skis and boots.

Assuming that there is snow at Whitetail on January 4, the Ski Center is having a demo day where you can try some of the more exotic skis that are available this season. I look forward to skiing at Whitetail on January 4, and hope to see many PVS members there that day.

Dick's musical ability was expressed through playing a baritone horn in a community band in Springfield, VA and he was a member of a church choir in Washington, D.C. for forty years. He was also very fond of the several cats he and Marilyn enjoyed.



The present TOOT staff includes Content/Proof Editor, E. Thayer; Layout Editors: J. Marx, M. Hass, and D. Warthen; USPS TOOT distribution, B. Leonhardt; and Electronic TOOT distribution, D. Warthen.

Recent updates to the PVS website, under the Past Events button, are graphical presentations of the present year's events with guest access to those TOOT write ups via secure links. This is a user-friendly feature for those seeking information about our ski club and possible membership.

Other TOOT information also appears on the PVS website: ski trip announcements, the current TOOT calendar of events, PVS Charter and Founding Members, Past PVS Presidents and ExCom Members, and the PVS Cook Book.

Global Warming could destroy the ski industry says Marvin Hass, quoting the NY Times. As temperatures increase, the nation's ski areas, especially those at lower elevations and latitudes, will eventually vanish. More than half of the 103 ski resorts in the Northeast will not be able to maintain a 100-day season by 2039. In Aspen, CO the snowpack could be confined to the top quarter of the mountain.

The strategy for coping with a lack of snow is to make it; 88 percent of resorts do so. Improvements in snow-making technology have helped resorts compensate for warming trends. But that may not be the case for long. With nighttime minimum temperatures warming at a faster rate than daytime maximum temperatures, it is uncertain as to what extent snow-making will last as an adaptation strategy. Further, even in the Rockies, it is difficult to find enough water to make snow. After last year's dry winter and a parched, sweltering summer, reservoirs are depleted, and streams are low.
