TID BIT

The Raptor Center (TRC), St Paul, MN

(You may have heard about Snowy Owls, who usually stay in Canada, turning up in various, unlikely locations, including downtown DC. This bird was hit by a bus and transferred to TRC for treatment. I grew up within walking distance to this facility located on the University of Minnesota agriculture campus and was proud that "our" Snowy Owl was sent here.)

TRC has treated more than 900 sick and injured raptors this past year.

"DC" Snowy Flies Free

This past Saturday, Dr. Ponder released the "DC" snowy owl at a location near Superior, WI. This spot has been frequented by other snowy owls in the past. Individuals of this species move from breeding grounds to areas where food is more plentiful in the winter, even during non-irruptive years. The habitat will support the bird until he starts his journey back to his northern region.

The "imped" feathers (replacement feathers for the bird's singed ones) from a procedure done in TRC's clinic, helped power his strong flight.

SKI TALK

May 2014

What a great winter we had! I know many were complaining about the cold and the snow, but isn't that just what we skiers want? We had excellent local ski conditions, which happens perhaps once every 20 years. Now we are in the process of planning for next season. While we have our January 2015 Snowmass trip in place and the Eurofest to Mayrhofen in March planned, we still need a February 2015 trip. Please send me recommendations, ideas, etc. Of course, to run ski trips, we need leaders, so don't be shy. Let me know if you might consider leading a trip.



According to the National Ski Areas Association and the Associated Press, older skiers are an important market. Senior skiers 68 and older averaged 9.5 days of skiing per season, whereas, the 49-67 group only skied five days per year! Who said we should try to attract younger members? Perhaps we should continue looking at the senior market! The article gives credit for this to shaped skis, better snowmaking and grooming, and even artificial hips and knees. Also, older skiers have more time and more discretionary funds than their younger counterparts. They also belong to ski clubs. That adds a social dimension and keeps the price down for skiing.

One of the most important things for a senior (or any skier for that matter) is to get in shape and stay strong. This is a good time to get your summer exercise program set up as the weather is getting warmer. Get your bike out and on the trails. Plan to go hiking or just walking. Consider a Pilates or Yoga class for flexibility, and do some weight training. You want to stay flexible and strong. In addition to all of the other benefits of exercise, research has found that walking two or more hours per week helped preserve auditory function. Moving your legs may help your ears! Exercise may improve blood flow to the cochlea, and also protect it against oxidative damage. Who knew?

Congratulations to Herb Bennett & Jon Wechsler:

At the 49th Annual PVS Meeting held at the Jablons' home in DC, Herb **Bennett** (Sponsor – John **Holt**) and Jon **Wechsler** (Sponsors – Rosemary & Dick **Schwartzbard**) were unanimously approved as fully Active and Active Associate PVS individual members, respectively.

Getting to Know Jon Wechsler (New Active Associate Member):

A fond "hello" is sent to you from Jon Wechsler in Rhinebeck, New York. I am a 69-year old, retired, school teacher (high school American history), living in the Hudson River Valley, about half way between New York City and Albany. I have lived most of my life in this beautiful area, and have skied in the nearby Catskill Mountains for decades. I have had a Season Pass at Hunter Mountain, about an hour from my home, for many years. I have also been a long-standing member of the Hudson River Valley Ski Club.

I started skiing on a golf course near by family home in the 1950's, and have continually enjoyed this wonderful sport. At my high school, I actually began the ski club in the mid 1970's. I try to go on a couple of ski trips each winter. I skied in January for the day with a group of PVS members, including my friends, Rosemary & Dick Schwartzband. So, my level of skiing is about the same as theirs.

I look forward to repeating that Snowmass adventure in 2015, as a PVS member.

Utah Proposes the World's Second Largest Lift- Connected Resort:

"On March 19, 2014, Nathan Rafferty, CEO of Ski Utah, a marketing and trade organization of the state's ski resorts, and representatives from Alta, Brighton, Canyons, Deer Valley, Park City Mountain Resort, Snowbird, and Solitude held a joint news conference to announce their support for a connection between all seven of the resorts via chairlift and ski runs, forming a European-style mega resort to be called ONE Wasatch.

The resorts in the Wasatch Mountains, which are in close proximity to each other, would be

connected via chairlift; ski runs would allow access by intermediate level and above skiers to more than 18,000 skiable acres (7,284 hectares) and more than 750 runs, serviced by 100 lifts, and accessed on a single lift ticket. The proposed plan calls for connecting Big and Little Cottonwood Canyons, connecting Big Cottonwood to Park City Resort, connecting Park City Resort and Canyons -- all of which could be done on private property but would still require government approval due to watershed issues that must be addressed. Dropping the rope line that currently divides Deer Valley and Park City Resort would instantly connect those resorts, and Alta and Snowbird have been connected for years.

At the news conference, Nathan Rafferty of Ski Utah pointed out that, at this point, ONE Wasatch is a concept, not a plan, and it's certainly not a reality. Right now, the idea is to establish a vision for a one-of-a-kind mountain experience by providing information, defining the process, encouraging dialog, and listening to feedback. But, once a consensus is made, the resorts say that the connecting lifts could be installed in a single summer's construction cycle. . .

If successful, the connection would create North America's largest ski resort and it would be the world's second largest, after France's Les Trois Vallées with 24,711 acres (10,170 hectares) of terrain, but larger than Italy's Sella Ronda (currently the world's second-largest lift-connected ski resort at 6,900 hectares). . . Clearly, if accomplished, this concept could be a game changer in the North American -- and the world's -- ski market! Are our constitutional rights being lost? Marvin Hass is tracking a possible affront. Alta is one of the last resorts to prohibit snowboards. In January a lawsuit was filed by four snowboarders claiming discrimination on national forest lands. Attorneys for the snowboarders argue that the ban violates the promise of equal treatment under the 14th Amendment.

Lawyers for Alta said in their recent court filing that "it demeans the Constitution to suggest that the amendment that protected the interests of former slaves during Reconstruction and James Meredith and the Little Rock Nine must be expanded to protect the interests of those who engage in a particularized winter sport" and that there "is no authority holding that the zone of interest created by the Fourteenth Amendment protects those who stand sideways snowboards." Further, the resort's permit with the Forest Service allows Alta to restrict any type of skiing device that creates an unnecessary risk to other skiers.

We will see what happens. Kneenuf!
