DIRECTIONS FROM THE BELTWAY: Take the Van Dorn Street exit (exit 173 approaching from the west) and turn onto South Van Dorn Street. Continue on South Van Dorn, crossing over Franconia Road at the fourth light. Stay in the right lane, continue past another light and, right before the next light, bear right onto Kingstowne Village Parkway (a small lake is on the right and a shopping center on the left). At the next light, turn right onto Manchester Boulevard and proceed about 200 feet to a light. Turn right at the light onto Manchester Lakes Drive and proceed about 400 feet. Turn right, go to the second right turn (Manchester Park Circle) and enter the Townes of Manchester Park. At the intersection, bear right. 6145 Manchester Park Circle is in the third townhouse complex on the left.

Early birds can park in the driveway; others make a left turn to find available parking around the corner.

Join PVS for A Trip to Historic Fredericksburg, Virginia Saturday, November 2, 2013

Experience a day back in time with PVS's Melissa FitzGerald, whose family was instrumental in resurrecting and preserving the legacy of historic Fredericksburg, Virginia. Ray and Nancy McKinley join Melissa in offering a tour of historic sights from the 1700s in Fredericksburg, just 50 miles south of D.C. The lovely old town on the Rappahannock River boasts 18th century and Victorian houses, is the site of three significant Civil War battles, and is where George Washington got his early education. Adding to its charm, the historic district of Fredericksburg is home to numerous galleries and cafes. Melissa will help make history come alive as she regales us with stories of Fredericksburg's illustrious past.

Choose to drive (or carpool) the hour's drive to Fredericksburg. Alternatively, take a peaceful train ride to the center of town on Amtrak from Alexandria leaving at about 8:00 am (round trip about \$50). We will meet at the Visitor's Center at 10:15 am and take a 75-minute (\$17) guided trolley tour of the highlights: Kenmore (Betty Washington's home), the Mary Washington House, the fascinating Hugh Mercer Apothecary Shop, and the Rising Sun Tavern built by George's brother. After our tour, stop for lunch at La Petit Auberge or Eileen's café in the middle of town. Then plan to walk and visit some of the sights in more depth, or stroll the streets of shops and galleries.

If you come by car, you may visit Chancellorsville Battlefield (site of one of the bloodiest days in the Civil War) or relive on film the critical battles at the Fredericksburg Visitors Center where an excellent museum provides details. On your way back to Washington, you may stop at Belmont, the home and studio of Gari Melcher, one of the most celebrated American artists of the late 19th century.

Alyeska's base elevation is 250 feet and the total vertical rise is 3,200 feet. The summit is accessed by the Aerial Tram and provides a panorama of the Chugach Mountains, with water views in one direction and glaciers in the other. Alyeska offers a mountain experience for all levels of skiers and riders, with 1,500 skiable acres, 113 acres of snowmaking, and average annual snowfall of 650 inches. Ski terrain composition is 11% Beginner, 52% Intermediate, and 37% Expert/Advanced.



Accommodations are double occupancy deluxe rooms in the Hotel Alyeska with



ski-in/out access. The hotel offers complimentary guest use of the saltwater pool, whirlpool, traditional sauna, and fitness room. The Spa offers an extensive variety of specialty and custom treatments.

Jessma lives in Boulder, CO and shared her experience during the devastating floods that hit that area. She said that she was fortunate to only lose power for one day, and hot water for two. However, her retirement home, aside from her wing, suffered tremendous damage. Manv garden apartments were flooded and furnishings were destroyed. Jessma's car was not damaged in ankle-deep water, but 80 cars in two other garages were totally destroyed; water reached the ceiling of those garages. Health Care and Assisted Living floors were totally flooded, so those residents had to be relocated to other homes in the area. The woman who heads the Activities Dept. has a home in the country outside of Boulder. She and her husband went out to tend to their horses, just as the huge wave of flooding came rushing toward them. They grabbed on to a tree and hung there for FIVE HOURS until they were rescued. Their house was destroyed. It is hard to imagine all of the tragedies in the Boulder area. A year's worth of rain fell in one week. PVS sends best wishes to Jessma and her friends as Boulder recovers.
