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# President's Message

I have just returned from another excellent trip to Snowmass. The snow was good, and although the weather was cold, most of the trip participants braved the cold and skied most days. In keeping with the food theme of my last message, I will report on our restaurant experiences at Snowmass. The Mountain Chalet has instituted a new food service system – rather than the buffets of previous years for both breakfast and dinner, the lodge now provides a served main course for breakfast and a served lunch. For breakfast, there is still a buffet of fruit, orange juice, yoghurt, cereal, muffins, bread, and bagels. The buffet no longer exists for lunch – no more cookies, apples, oranges or rolls and peanut butter (oranges were available if you knew to ask). Lunch consists of a bowl of soup and a sandwich (quesadillas, braised beef, etc.). Seconds were provided upon request. The food was very good, nicely presented, and the portions, particularly for breakfast, very generous. However, at breakfast, it could take a while to be served. Since most people came to breakfast at 7:30, and the lifts did not open until 9, that was not a problem.

We had a nice welcome party with food purchased locally – rolls, meat and cheese platters, and wraps. Our Saturday pizza party featured excellent varieties of pizza – cheese, pepperoni, and vegetable. For our final dinner, we went to the wonderful German restaurant in the Timberline Lodge ("The Edge"), where we had a choice of appetizers and entrees and were treated to a sampling of a variety of desserts. The pork schnitzel was excellent – other choices included salmon and steak. I enjoyed a mug of hot mulled wine – a drink I had been looking forward to for a year.

Apart from The Edge, our favorite restaurant was Kenichi, a Japanese restaurant at the base of the mountain. I had excellent shrimp tempura and spider rolls with crab meat and other ingredients. If you want to go to this restaurant on your next trip to Snowmass, you will need to make reservations well in advance. We have also been to the Kenichi restaurant in Aspen on a trip last year, but prefer the Snowmass Kenichi.

We also went to II Poggio, a favorite of many PVS members. I had a good seafood and pasta dish – it was a special, and I neglected to ask the price. It turned out to be twice the amount of most of the items on the menu, but fortunately, Bob finished what I could not eat. II Poggio is another restaurant generally requiring advance reservations.

Other restaurants that we tried were Mawita, a new Latin-American restaurant at the base of the mountain, Wienerstube, a German restaurant in the space formally occupied by the Little Mammoth Steak House, and A Slice of Italy, at the base of the mountain. Mawita was fine, but not exceptional – service was slow and the food fairly standard. I ordered what purported to be a chicken fajita, but what I got was really a chicken quesadilla – it was good, just not what I expected. I might

consider going to this restaurant again, but would prefer to go to Venga, Venga, one of

my favorites at Snowmass.

I would not recommend Wienerstube – the chicken schnitzel that I had was fried in oil that was used one time too many. The night we were there, the restaurant had a staffing problem, and we had a long wait. They did comp us for the wine and dessert, which was very generous of them. I, however, thought the apple strudel that they

gave us was a little heavy on the dough and light on the apple - the apple strudel at The Edge is much better. I found A Slice of Italy to be somewhat disappointing. The fried calamari were good, but the ravioli was bland and uninteresting. The pizza looked good, but we did not have any. This restaurant might be worth another try, particularly if one wants pizza.

Other trip participants liked the new restaurant in the Stonebridge Inn (Heather's Pies) and the Vue Lounge at the Viewline Hotel. Clearly, we all ate very well on the trip, and hopefully did enough exercise to ski off all the calories. I look forward to our next trip to Snowmass.

Burr! Hope it's warmed up by the time you read this! Lots of inside time for reading, though. Come share what you've been reading by joining us on Zoom. We have a nice chat and learn about good reads we hadn't thought to pick up ourselves. See the info at the bottom for how to join in on February 13th, 2025 (the second Thursday of each month) at 4 pm!

Here are the books we shared in January:

<u>Marianne Soponis</u> brought us "The Lifeboat" by Charlotte Rogan. Newlywed and now widowed, Grace finds herself in an overloaded lifeboat for 21 harrowing and deadly days when the ship she and her husband were sailing on goes down in 1914. **5\*** 

<u>Ellie Thayer</u> just read "The Demon of Unrest" the latest by Erik Larson. Larson researched and wrote about the pivotal time in the 4 months between the election of Abraham Lincoln and the start of the Civil War when Fort Sumter was attacked. **5\*** 

<u>Karen Knopes</u> felt a personal connection to "Absolution," Alice McDermott's tale of two American women in Saigon just before the Vietnam War. The role of women whose husbands were stationed there resonated with Karen's experience as she recalled the attitude that they felt they were doing service to the people of Vietnam. The second half of the book focused on later years in the US and was less compelling. **4.5\*** 

<u>Jan Marx</u> liked hearing about Bonnie Sweeney's offering from last month's BYOB, "The Sex Lives of Cannibals" by J. Martin Troost so she decided to read and offer a few additional remarks on the book. Jan gave it **4.5\*** 

<u>Dorian Janney</u> brought Booker-prize-winning "Prophet Song" by Paul Lynch set in Dublin in which a mother of four faces wrenching choices when her husband disappears. Dorian called it "not uplifting" but it helped her understand more about the choices that may have to be made during difficult situations, especially by women. 5\*

<u>Mary Hubbard</u> (joining us from Snow Searchers) told us about "Rebel Falls" by Tim Wendell. Taking place toward the end of the Civil War, the story is told from the perspective of a young woman tasked with being a spy for the Union side and her attempt to foil a plot to upend the war effort. Mary enjoyed it but it "dragged a bit in spots." **4\*** 

Nancy McKinley enjoyed "Playground," Richard Powers' latest set between the US, Canada, and French Polynesia. Multiple protagonists' stories converge on a plan to create underwater living in the event of climate catastrophe. Themes of friendship, climate change, AI, colonialism, and the uncharted undersea world make for a fascinating read. 5\*

# SNOWMASS '25


